- **Completion**: Prompt students with a sentence stem for them to complete
- **Recall**: Prompt students to relay their understanding of what was read.
- **Open-ended:** Prompt students to express ideas and questions related to what was read.
- Wh- Prompt students with who, what, when, where, why questions.
- **Distancing**: Prompt students to relate pictures and/or words in the text to their own experiences.

During partner reading, distribute one set of cards to each partnership. While reading, partners can engage in dialogue about the text by rotating through the cards and discussing the given prompts.
